The News Condensed.

There is no prospect of tariff legislation,
though the quinine manufacturers favor it.

White Eagle told his story to the com-
mittee yesterday.

The appropriation for public printing is
exhausted.

Erastus Cooke has been appointed a
Supreme Court Judge for New York state.

It is said that 2,000 men are ready to in-
vade the Indian Territory.

It is said that Erance proposes negotia-
tions to end the war between Chili and
Peru.

Congressman De La Matyr, of Indiana,
has been re-nominated by the Greenback-
ers.

The delegates from Indiana to the Repub-
lican National Convention are said to be
strongly anti-Grant.

The Republican members of the Maine
Legislature passed resolutions yesterday
urging the nomination of Senator Blaine.

A number of capitalists of San Francis-
co have come to New York, and now some
of the Chinese are coming also. One
hundred of them arrived yesterday.

Henry Hepper, the law partner of Sena-
tor Bayard, was found dead in bed at Wil-
mington Del., on Wednesday morning.
He is believed to have died of apoplexy
during the night.

Marshal MacMahon is said to have
spent a great deal of his private income
when he was President and he is now
obliged to sell a part of his mansion in
Paris.

A Washington Senator is said to have
offered to give a handsome party on the
Fourth of July if the next Republican tick-
et doesn't prove to be Blaine and Logan.
That is a brand-new combination.

Hon. Edward McPherson, of Pennsyl-
vania, has been elected chairman of the
Republican Congressional Committee, in
place of George Gorham, of California.
He has accepted the position.

A new anti-slave trade convention has
been concluded between Great Britain
and Germany wheres by cooperation be-
tween the war vessels of the two, powers
in the suppression of the slave traffic is
assured.

The ninety-sixth annual session of the
Baltimore Conference of the Methodist
Episcopal Church assembled in that city
Wednesday. Bishop Andrews presided,
assisted by Bishop Bowman. The con-
ference is very full, nearly all the members
being present, and will continue in ses-
sion several days.

The Lehigh Valley Railroad Company
have under consideration the construction
in connection with the Pennsylvania
Railroad, of a road from a point on the
connecting railway at or near the Ridge
Avenue station in Philadelphia, by way
of Germantown, Chestnut Hill, Con-
shohoken and Norristown to Bethlenem.

The reports from Kansas City show
that the white man is getting ready to
break another solemn promise made to
the Indian. The President's proclamation
warning all persons against any invasion
of the Indian Territory threatens to be of
no more effect than a puff of wind. The
people are said to be determined to enter
the Territory "at all hazards."

The Secretary of the Interior had a con-
ference with Chief Ouray, the Uncompah-

gre, and White River Utes, at which the
Indians virtually agreed to accept the
terms of the government and cede their
reservation as soon as a definite under-
standing is reached. The Secretary will
submit the terms of the agreement to
Congress. At a previous interview the
Southern Ute delegation consented to
give up their present reservation.
