The News Condensed.

Bishop O'Hara has collected in the
Scranton diocese for Irish relief \$8,351.33.

The President confirmed the sentence
of dismissal in the case of Major Reno.

The number of families living in New
York city is 213,467.

The French Senate has passed the bill
embodying the postal money order con-
vention with the United States.

A company, composed of New Yorkers,
has been organized to prospect for min-
erals in Potter county. It will also bore
for oil.

The total number of physicians, dent-
ists and pharmacists who have graduated
from the different colleges in Philadelphia
this year is 621.

The Western Nail Association met at
Pittsburg yesterday. A test suspension
has been ordered to find out the condition
of the trade.

Chief Ouray was before the House Com-
mittee on Indian Affairs yesterday, but he
said he knew nothing personally about
the Thornburg fight.

General Louis Wagner has requested
Secretary Thompson to take annually a
number of the Girard College students on
board the naval training ship.

The Grove Brothers of Danville, have
leased the Carterville Furnace, Lycoming
county, which has been lying idle for sev-
eral years, and start it up about the 1st
April. About one hundred men will be
employed.

All the furniture manufacturing estab-
lishments of Williamsport are crowded
with work that they find great difficulty
in keeping up with their orders. One
firm received an order the other day for
one hundred suites of a certain kind from
one house

David Harris, who died, at the age of
eighty-three years, in Harrisburg, a few
days ago, was the grandson of John
Harris, the founder of that city. He was
one of the last survivors of the Harris-
burg Guards, which, in 1814, took part
in the Baltimore campaign.

It is alleged that the Pope, having
learned that several Catholic dignitaries
in England had used violent language
against the British government and sup-
ported the Irish movement, has expressed
disapproval of their conduct and dis-
patched letters of reprimand to Eng-
land.

The Chief of the Bureau of Statistics
reports that the total value of the exports
of domestic provisions and tallow for the
month of February, 1880, was \$9,178,283
and for February, 1879 \$12,147,180 For
the eight months ended February, 1880,
\$70,061,000, and for the eight months en-
ded February, 1879, \$74,246,449.

The Republican County Committee
of Lancaster have fixed the 22d of May
for the primary elections, to nominate a
county ticket and elect delegates to the
Chicago Convention. A vote of the peo-
ple to express their preference for Presi-
dent and United States Senator, to be
used as instructions to delegates and rep-
resentatives, was also authorized.

Elisha J Forrest, one of the oldest mem-
bers of the Lehigh county bar, left for
Philadelphia last Thursday to pay some
interest money to Powers & Weightman.
The money has not been paid and Forrest
has not been heard from. His family and
friends are distressed at his disappea-
rance.
