The News Condensed.

There are about seventy missionary societies.

There are nearly 2,250,000 Baptists in the United States.

The Protestant Episcopal Church has 320,000 members in the United States.

There are about 1,650,000 heathen converts to Christianity.

The Appomattox and Roanoke floods are receding.

The Iowa Senate yesterday agreed to grant school suffrage to women.

It has been decided to hold the New Hampshire Republican State Convention May 5.

Fire has destroyed the button factory at Mendota, Ill. Loss, \$20,000; insurance, 7,000.

The translation of the entire Bible into the language of the New Hebrides has just been completed.

The Presbyterian Church of England requires its foreign missionaries to come home once every seven years.

Non-Conformists have 122,000 church sittings in London, a gain of 83,000 in fifteen years.

Two men have been arrested in Harrisburg for stealing department reports and selling them for old paper.

Yesterday Gov. Hoyt signed the death warrants for the execution of the Raber murders on May 13th.

Parole won the Liverpool spring cup yesterday, but was objected to on the ground of a cross.

It is expected that Secretary Sherman will authorize the purchase of \$4,000,000 in bonds on Wednesday next instead of \$2,000,000 as heretofore.

There is a strike among the negro laborers of St. Charles Parish, La., which causes considerable alarm among the whites, and the governor has sent a company of militia to the parish.

A man named Miller was murdered near Lock Haven Thursday night, and his wife and a paramour named Smith have been arrested on suspicion of having committed the crime.

A Pittsburg dispatch says: The Western Iron Association to-day held a largely-attended meeting. Every iron manufacturing district west of the Allegheny Mountains was represented. After considerable discussion a four-cent card rate was affirmed.

Orders have been issued by the Treasury Department to pre pay without rebate all interest on the public debt falling due April 1, on and after Monday, March 22. Drafts for registered interest will be mailed by that time or as soon thereafter as possible.

A Washington telegram says that Senator Anthony received a dispatch from Providence yesterday afternoon, announcing that the eight delegates to the Chicago Convention chosen by the Rhode Island Republican State Convention are all Blaine men.

Shortly after the death of A. T. Stewart of New York, Alexander Stewart, of Cavendish, Vt., went to that city to contest the will of the deceased. He returned home having, as he averred, obtained the promise that he should have \$100,000 in money, a farm and other property. He now claims that the terms of the contract have not been complied with, and on

Thursday last he attached all of the A. T. Stewart' property in Woodstock Village, Vt., consisting of mills, a boarding house and a residence. The trial will probably come off at the coming May term of the Windsor County Court at Woodstock.
