The News Condensed.

The amount paid the Greeks for Col. Syngle's release was \$12,000.

The Queen formally prorogued Parliament yesterday on account of the approaching general election.

Mrs. Miller has confessed that Smith and herself murdered her husband at Lock Haven.

Senator Voorhees is too ill to attend the funeral of his father, who has just died at the age of 87.

Gen. Grant telegraphs that he will visit San Antonio, and will not reach New Orleans until Wednesday next.

Some coal operators are advancing the theory that if the mines were worked on half time through April it would prevent a stoppage in August or September.

Two parties of Indians had a regular battle in Indian Territory yesterday. A number were killed and wounded on each side.

By the order of Queen Victoria, a stone cross has been erected on the spot where the Prince Imperial lost his life in Zulu-land.

It is stated that a test vote taken by the House Committee on elections showed that a majority of the committee is opposed to unseating Mr. Washburn.

A heavy snow storm has been experienced in Vermont. Fifteen inches had fallen yesterday and it was still snowing fast evening.

Most of the piano manufacturing establishments in New York are again running, all the differences between the employers and employes having been satisfactorily adjusted.

The brother of the late M. S. Co. s. y, in an interview on Monday made the remark the estate his sis. e. bequeathed to J. d. Davis was very valuable, her residence alone costing \$350,000.

The Herald says there is reason to believe that Mr. Kellogg is safe in his seat, as most of the Southern Senators hold that Hill's report against him is wrong and ill advised. Some, it is understood, will vote against unseating Mr. Kellogg.

A Denver dispatch reports that the Indians on Friday attacked a stage, carrying the mails, near Martin's Well, killed the driver and carried off the mails. The Indians cut the military telegraph suspending communication between the troops in the field and Santa Fe.

The greenback State Convention nominated F. W. Dewees for Supreme Judge, and A. S. Roberts, of Crawford county, for Auditor General. The selection of delegates at large to the national convention was referred to the State Committee. Hendrick B. Wright was endorsed for President.

The Ponca Indians, Bright Eyes and Woodworker, accompanied by their manager, W. H. Tibbles, have returned to Philadelphia after a visit of nearly four weeks at Washington, where they gave their testimony before the committee of the House of Representatives.

Senator Hill, has made an affidavit and submitted it to the District Attorney complaining of the threats of the woman Jessie Raymond, and denying that he is the father of her child. Lemuel W. Smalls, of Georgia, has also made an affidavit that the woman has threatened Senator Hill's life. The matter was referred to the Police Court for action.
