### The News Condensed.

A whale sixty-five feet long was towed into New York harbor yesterday by a tug boat.

Many remonstrances are being forwarded to Harrisburg against the pardon of the riot bribery men.

The House Committee on Indian affairs having completed their examination. Ouray and the other Ute chiefs have returned to Colorado.

The WilkesBarre Record says there is no truth in the rumor that Attorney General Palmer contemplates resigning his office.

It is reported that a large number of Sitting Bull's band have applied at Fort Peck for rations, offering to surrender their arms and ponies.

General T. H. Simpson, of the army, has retired to private life at St. Paul, Minnesota. He had been in the service of the government fifty-two years.

On Thursday, at Bradford, burglars chloroformed Charles Thilo, manufacturer of band wheels, at his lodgings, and stole his wallet, containing \$4,000.

The Rev. Dr. John Hall really gets about \$19,000 a year instead of \$15 000, for he has the use of a parsonage that cost \$60,000, and that would rent for \$4,000.

Mrs. Daniel S. Dickinson, the aged widow of the late Senator Dickinse, is hopelessly ill at the residence of a friend in New York. It is thought hardly possible that she can live many days longer.

Advices from Kansas report that of the 22 counties in that State which have chosen delegates to the State Convention, fourteen send solid delegations for Blaine, three for Grant, and five are divided.

At San Francisco, on Tuesday evening a council of two hundred of the Citizens' Protective Union nominated fifteen freeholders as candidates at the approaching charter election—eight democrats and seven republicans.

The Episcopal church at Lithgom, Dutchess county, N. Y., burned Wednesday. Lenten services were in progress, but the small congregation escaped through the windows. No one was injured. Loss \$3,000.

Col. Thomas A. Scott has just been re-elected president of the Pennsylvania railroad company. The reviving business boom was attested at the same time by a liberal advance in the wages of employes, to take effect April first.

Elmira Advertiser: There died at the poor house, over the hills at B. export, last week, Christian Leop, aged eighty-one years. He will be recollected by many of the older inhabitants. Few had lived in Elmira longer than he.

Professor Agassiz is said to receive an income of \$2,500 a day from the Calumet and Hecla copper mines of Lake Superior, of which he is president and a shareholder. He bought at 5 cents on the dollar, seeing the value of the mines, when the stock was selling at that price.

A man named Eugene Fairfax Williamson was arrested in Baltimore yesterday, and confessed to being the author of the late annoyances to Dr. Morgan Dix and others. He confesses to the charges, but says he had no motive. His residence is in Pittsburg. He is unquestionably a knave or mad, and if the latter it must be acknowledged there was method in his madness.
