**The News Condensed.**

Pittston has two woollen mills.  
The Dakota Republican Convention will be held on May 19.  
One hundred Arkansas negroes have left that State for Liberia.  
St. John, New Brunswick, is covered with a mantle of snow one foot thick.  
M. de Lesseps arrived at Council Bluffs, Iowa, on his way East yesterday.  
Rear Admiral, William LeRoy, U. S. navy, has been placed on the retired list, to date from the 24th.

The Masonic Female College, at Lumpkin, Ga., was destroyed by fire on Thursday. Loss, \$20,000.  
There is a rumor from Washington that Gen. Grant has positively declined to allow his name to go before the Chicago Convention.

A large number of laborers at Mount Mitchell, the new summer resort near Long Branch, have struck for higher wage.

The articles of corporation of the Ladies Co-operative Dress Association of New York city, with a capital of \$250,000, were filed yesterday.

It is stated that the Czar has mortally wounded with a pistol shot his confidential servant, who entered the bedroom of his majesty during the night, thinking the Czar had called.

The County Convention of the Miners and Laborers' Benevolent Association met at Pottsville yesterday, in secret session. The meeting will be continued to-day. Nothing can be learned of the proceedings.

The debate in the New Brunswick House of Assembly on the seat of government question was closed on Tuesday night, when a resolution in opposition to the removal to St. John was carried by a vote of 20 to 18.

Information received from Egypt states that before the obelisk can be lowered Commander Goringe will have to send to England to have manufactured a jack to be used in the work of lowering it. It is thought it will be October before the obelisk reaches New York.

A State convention of the county, city and borough school superintendents of Pennsylvania will be held in Harrisburg on the 20th, 21st and 22d of April. The convention had been called a week later, but in view of the fact that the Democratic State Convention will meet there on April 28 the time was changed.

It is announced that the first bill on the Senate calendar on Monday will be Mr. Kernan's bill for the New York International Exhibition of 1883. The Senate will begin the week well by passing the bill promptly. If the Exhibition is to be the brilliant success it should be, action by Congress cannot be safely delayed much longer.

A government check for \$310,500, for payment of quarterly interest on the four per cent. bonds, was paid through the Clearing House New York yesterday. This interest represents a principal of \$31,050,000, which is the largest holding of any one person in any of the government securities. The daily income of that amount of bonds is \$3,450. The check was to William H. Vanderbilt.
