The articles of corporation of the Ladies Co-operative Dress Association of New York city, with a capital of \$250, 000, were filed yesterday.

It is stated that the Czar has mortally wounded with a pistol shot his confidential servant, who entered the bedroom of his majesty during the night, thinking the Czar had called.

The County Convention of the Miners and Laborers' Benevolent Association met at Pottsville yesterday, in secret session. The meeting will be continued to-day. Nothing can be learned of the proceedings.

The debate in the New Brunswick House of Assembly on the seat of government question was closed on Tuesday night, when a resolution in opposition to the removal to St. John was carried by a vote of 20 to 18.

Information received from Egypt states that before the obelisk can be lowered Commander Gorringe will have to send to England to have manufactured a jack to be used in the work of lowering it. It is thought it will be October before the obelisk reaches New York.

A State convention of the county, city and borough school superintendents of Pennsylvania will be held in Harrisburg on the 20th, 21st ank 22d of April.
