Easter exercises at Christ Church to-morrow at 10:30. Evening service will be omitted. The Sunday School Easter Festival will be held at 3 o'clock.

EASTER.—The festival of Easter, observed by the Christian Church in commemoration of the resurrection of Christ, occurs to-morrow.

The name of the festival originated from the belief that Christ was typified by the paschal lamb, ordained by Moses in the feast of the passover; thus Paul says in 1 Cor. 5, 7, "For even Christ our passover was sacrificed for us." The first Christians were, therefore, considered to continue the Jewish feast; understanding by the lamb which was sacrificed at the festival, Jesus who suffered for mankind. Among the Roman Catholics and Greeks, Easter is the most joyful festival of the church, and is also observed with great solemnity by the English church, the Lutheran and the European Calvinists. The Greek and Roman Catholics did not celebrate it at precisely the same time, and while some Christians were mourning in commemoration of the passion, others were rejoicing in the resurrection of the Saviour. In the second century the dispute became warm. The Eastern church would not discontinue the celebration of the feast at the same time with the Jews, whilst the Western church insisted upon celebrating it without the paschal lamb, and beginning on Sunday, the day of Christ's resurrection. It was finally settled by the council of Nice, in 325, that the feast should be held on Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal equinox, and not on the same day with the Jews. The English name *Easter*, and the German *Ostern*, are most probably derived from the name of the feast of the Teutonic goddess *Ostera*, which was celebrated by the ancient Saxons early in the spring, and for which, as in many other instances, the first missionaries wisely substituted the Christian feast.

Easter fires, Easter eggs, and many other customs and superstitions, have all their origin from the ancient heathen feast, which as the celebration of the resurrection of nature, was very appropriately succeeded by the festival which commemorates the resurrection of Christ.

The day will be observed with appropriate exercises in the Episcopal, Catholic and Universalist Churches of this place. At Christ Church (Episcopal), in addition to the usual church service, the Sunday School will hold its annual festival at 3 o'clock.

EASTER SERVICES.—The Easter Services at the Church of the Messiah (Universalist), will be observed at 7 P. M., and embrace the following order:

- 1st. Voluntary, Instrumental—Rossini.
  - 2d. Liturgical Service for Easter, embracing Solo and Quintette, "Christ is Risen."
  3. Prayer.
  4. Easter Anthem—Composed for the Occasion by the Pastor.
  5. Sermon—Theme: "The moral effect of Christ's Resurrection."
  6. Hymn—Alleluia.
  7. Benediction.
