The News Condensed.

Gen Grant's brother-in-law, Corbin, died in Jersey City yesterday.

The Republican primaries in Iowa, on Saturday, resulted in a victory for Blaine.

A dispatch to the *News* from Austin, Texas, says: A majority of the delegates to the National Republican Convention openly declare for Grant.

The President and Secretaries Everts and Ramsey will attend the annual exhibition of the National Academy of design in New York to-morrow.

The report of the Indian investigating committee states that Commissioner Hayt was not guilty of corruption in the administration of his office, whatever else he may have done.

The Bonapartists are feeling their way to propagrandism in Paris by convening meetings in the artisan quarters. The meetings are technically private, admission being by ticket.

The journeymen tailors and girls employed by custom tailors in New York have resolved to demand an advance of wages or go on a strike. The packing box makers determined to take the same action.

The bill for the sale of the Western Railroad, for the consideration of which the present extra session of the North Carolina Legislature was called, passed its third and final reading in both houses on Friday without amendment.

The steamer *Enmore*, from Barrow, England, for Philadelphia, laden with railroad iron, has put into Halifax short of coal. She reports having been sixteen days on the passage and encountered a succession of heavy westerly gales.

Mr. Hutchins (N. Y.), member of Congress, wants to suppress the New York *Evening Post* for publishing article reflecting on the House for its cowardice in not directing the Ways and Means committee to report back the several tariff bills.

The House Committee on Indian Affairs wants Secretary Schurz to tell whether there have been any frauds or corrupt practices since July 1, 1877; on the part of inspectors, agents, employees or any other persons connected with the Indian service at the agencies or elsewhere.

The Postmaster General has issued an order to employees who may hereafter be engaged in preparing information for constituents of Congressmen at the latter's request to enclose the same in official envelopes addressed to the constituents, thus saving Congressmen the price of postage on such matter.

Assistant Secretary of the Treasury J. K. Upton, who has been confirmed by the Senate, will enter upon the duties of that office on Thursday, April 1st. The Secretary of the Treasury has finally concluded to appoint Major J. T. Power, chief clerk of the department, to succeed Mr. Upton. He will enter on his duties on the 1st proximo.

The board of Pardons met in Harrisburg on Saturday, to consider the application of W. H. Kemble and others charged with corrupt solicitation of members of the Legislature, refused to recommend the pardon. Secretary Quay and Secretary Dunkle voted for it, and Attorney General Palmer and Lieut. Gov. Stone against it. To-day is the time appointed by Judge Pearson to pronounce sentence.
