The News Condensed.

Kearney has had his case postponed for a week on account of illness.

The "Stamp Tavern," and old landmark of New Egypt, N. J., has been burned. The loss exceeds \$10,000, with no insurance.

A complete count of the San Francisco elections gives an average vote for the citizens-freeholders of 18,883; working-men, 11,477.

General Grant visited the New Orleans Cotton Exchange Saturday, where he met a committee from Mobile.

All the bribers except Kemble appeared in Harrisburg yesterday and entered bail for their appearance on the 26th. Kemble is expected to follow suit.

At the organization of Lancaster City Councils the Republicans bolted, giving the Democrats important offices in the city's administration.

The temperance friends of Francis Murphy in Philadelphia have presented him with an elegant residence handsomely furnished, in that city.

Tolerably full reports collected at Wilmington, Del., indicate that the Peninsula peach crop will not be affected by the recent cold weather.

The cremation society of Zurich, Switzerland, announces its intention to issue a loan, with premiums, to procure the necessary capital to construct buildings and apparatus.

Miss Ellie Sherman, the pretty young daughter of the General, is to be married early in May to Lieutenant Thackara, of the Navy. The wedding is to be celebrated at General Sherman's house in Washington.

The London Standard's dispatch from Vienna reports that the Egyptian troops have been defeated in Romanli at Berberah. The King of Abyssinia is marching with a large army against King Melenek of Shoa.

Yesterday morning a Lehigh Valley passenger train ran into a coal train at Coalport. Eight coal cars were thrown into the canal, the passenger engine was badly damaged, and the fireman was hurt. Both tracks were blockaded three or four hours.

At the recent town election in old Concord, Mass., only twenty votes were cast for the School Committee and all of these by women. The result was that three men and one woman were elected; the men for a period of three years, and the woman for only one year.

It is expected that the St. Gothard tunnel will be available for the transportation of the mails by the end of the year. The opening of the railway will be somewhat delayed by the construction of accessory tunnels; but the work will probably be finished by July 1, 1882.

Fred. Erb, Jr., has accepted a challenge of Captain A. H. Bogardus for a shooting match, for \$500 a side, to shoot 100 birds at 30 yards English rules. The match to be shot at St. Louis during the last week in April. Erb vanquished Bogardus in a match there on March 10.

Officers of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company have begun another examination of all the engineers, firemen and brakemen in their employ, for the purpose of discovering who among them, if any, are afflicted with what is known as color blindness, and also for the purpose of testing their vision in other respects.

Senator David Davis who has been called a rich man, is by his friends called "land poor." Since he first went to Illinois his surplus earnings have been invested in land.
