### The News Condensed.

Senator Thurman's friends are said to be still worried over the state his health.

The Cincinnati elections resulted in large majorities for the Republicans.

The colored boy, Hart, still leads in the Madison Square Grand pedestrian contest.

The colored citizens of Mobile, Ala., have invited Gen. Grant to visit that place and he has accepted.

In San Domingo a serious conspiracy has been discovered for the restoration of ex-President Gonzales.

In New York real estate is steadily going up in price, the advance in some localities being one hundred per cent.

A Prohibition State Convention is called to meet at Altoona on May 20. It will nominate a State ticket and select delegates to the National Convention.

A New York broker yesterday purchased \$3,000,000 of United States four per cent. bonds, at \$1.07 1/4. It is supposed the purchase was made for W. H. Vanderbilt.

The seventieth birthday of Rev. James Freeman Clarke, was celebrated in Boston Monday night by a brilliant gathering. Poems were read by Holmes Julia Ward Howe, and others.

It is said to be certain that the House military committee will recommend the appointment of General George B. McClellan as one of the members of the Board of Managers of the National Soldiers' Homes.

Prince Oscar of Sweeden and Norway is a youth of twenty years, whose beardless face looks even younger than that. He is a handsome boy, gracious and elegant in carriage and manner.

The Postmaster General has revoked the order withholding letters from the Colorado Land and Mineral Association. pending litigation in the United States Supreme Court, This is one of the associations pronounced as fraudulent by the department.

Rev. Dr. Morton, rector of St. James' Protestant Episcopal Church, Philadelphia, has announced to his congregation that the sum of \$37,500, needed to free the church from indebtedness has been raised and that the church will be consecrated on May 1.

A dispatch from Ferry Point, Montana, says the Indians who were driven into a ravine by three Companies of the Second Cavalry, thirty-five miles south of this place, escaped after two of them had been captured. General Miles is now on the ground.

A dispatch from Poughkeepsie says that Johnson Whittaker, the colored cadet at West Point, of the class of 1879, was found in bed yesterday morning, bound hand and foot, a piece of one ear cut off the other slit, and his head bruised. He stated that three masked men attacked him at midnight. It is believed that the outrage was committed by cadets.

At the election at Ithaca on Tuesday, Frear, Republican, was elected Supervisor by nearly two hundred majority. The whole Republican ticket was elected. Hook, anti-license, has over two hundred majority. Last year license had nearly five hundred, and Burt, (Dem.) for Supervisor, over four hundred majority.
