Some one here has replied through the last *Spirit of the Times* to the innocuous in regard to the trotter "W. M. Mallory." Here is the letter, and it was evidently written by one who knows whereof he affirms:

ABOUT W. M. MALLORY.—TOWANDA, PA., March, 23.—*Dear Spirit*: Knowing your generally correct word, and that you are not often misled, prompts me to correct some of the incorrect statements of "Little Bradford" about the horse W. M. Mallory. The horse was sold by Mr. Mallory, as reported, to Messrs. Odell, one of whom came here first, a perfect stranger to Mr. Mallory, to see the horse, and after some negotiation and correspondence came again and purchased him for \$10,500. The last time the horse was driven on the Towanda half-mile track—which is a trifle over—he made the first mile in 2:23, the third half-mile not taken correctly, but the fourth continuous half-mile was made in 1:11. The turns at each end being short, he was never permitted to go at full speed around them. Whether "Little Bradford" is ignorant, or why he misrepresents, or who he is, is not known; but in this country, as in most others, there are men who have horses just fast enough to be beaten by horses not considered very fast, who think that no horse can be fast owned or raised by any one else, and he is not correct as to the history of the mare. The Messrs. Odell write that the horse died of pneumonia, which, no doubt, is true.
