### The News Condensed.

Jackson & Morse, grain exporters of Boston, failed yesterday for \$80,000.

A Berlin dispatch announces the death, from small pox, of the King of Burmah.

The Postmaster General declares the "Boston Spoon Company" of Boston, a fraudulent concern.

It is not believed in Germany that the Emperor will accept the resignation of Bismarck.

The President has nominated William A. Newell, of New Jersey, as Governor of Washington Territory.

The Iowa delegates to the Cincinnati Convention are reported solid for Tilden.

Major William Post, a clerk in the New York Custom House, was found dead in his bed on Tuesday. He was formerly Governor Fenton's Private Secretary.

Mrs Daniel S. Dickinson, widow of the late United States Senator, died this morning at 6 o'clock, at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Samuel G. Courtney, at High Bridge.

Telegraphic dispatches claim that a majority of the delegates elected to the Massachusetts State Convention will favor a delegation for Edmunds to the Chicago Convention.

Ex-Congressman John B. Packer, of Sunbury, was stricken with paralysis on Sunday. He is a son-in-law of the late William Cameron, and he was a member of the Forty-first, Forty-second, Forty-third and Forty-fourth, Congresses.

Rhode Island held her election Wednesday. The Senate and Assembly are largely Republicans, which insures the election of the Republican candidates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, who, although they polled a large plurality, failed to receive a majority of the popular vote.

The Executive Committee of the Society of the Army of the Potomac has decided to change the date of the annual meeting to June 16th. Secretary Evarts has been invited to deliver the address but has not yet accepted. Joaquin Miller has accepted an invitation to deliver the poem.

A company formed in Philadelphia is said to have purchased the "Delaney patent telegraph relay," which, it is claimed, is a perfect substitute for the "Page patent." It is stated that the company proposes to contract with railroad and telegraph companies for a right to use the instrument.

In direct opposition to the advice and wishes of his counsel, Kemble has refused to make his appearance either to enter new bail or receive sentence. This he informs his counsel is his method of taking the bull by the horns. Although the sheriff of Dauphin county has made no application to the Governor for a requisition, he says he will endeavor to procure one on all the Governors in the United States if necessary to secure the fugitive.

A sad warning to children old enough to appreciate it, and one which parents will do well to try and impress upon those who are not, comes by telegraph from Paterson, N. J. Three years ago a little girl six years of age, endeavored to jump a rope 250 times, which brought on cerebro spinal meningitis, of which she died. On Monday of this week, a sister attempted a similar feat and died of the same disease on Tuesday.
