Council Proceedings.

COUNCIL CHAMBERS, Feb. 19, 1881.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council adjourned Feb. 7 for want of a quorum, to be convened subject to a call of the Burgess, was held this evening. Members present, W. H. Jones, Burgess, Alger, Holcomb, Kingsbury, Keeler, Montanye, Parsels, Rahm.

The minutes of the last monthly and special meetings were read and approved.

The committee appointed at the regular January session to examine and report on the Davenport claim for damages resulting from a fall from side walk, asked and obtained further time to investigate the case.

On motion of Councilman Montanye the Treasurer was authorized to accept the terms of compromise offered by H. T. June in behalf of the Episcopal Church, to wit: by the payment of \$25, which is to be in full for side walk bill of 1877.

At a special meeting held Jan. 13, a resolution was adopted requiring G. A. Dayton & Co. to take measures to abate a nuisance resulting from generating steam at their mill in the first ward, by burning buckwheat hulls. As no efforts have been made by the owners of the property to abate the nuisance, Councilman Parsels moved that the Burgess be directed to serve notice on Messrs. Dayton & Kuykendall, that unless the nuisance is abated at once, legal proceedings will be instituted against them. After some informal remarks by Messrs. Parsels, Holcomb and others in which it appeared that the fuel used was detrimental to the comfort of citizens in that vicinity, and had a tendency to greatly reduce the value of their property, the motion of Mr. Parsels was unanimously adopted.

Councilman Holcomb offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The Towanda Water Works has notified the Council that twenty-six hydrants of their works are completed and ready for use for supplying water for fire purposes, therefore

Resolved, That for the purpose of testing the efficiency of said hydrant for the purpose above mentioned, the Burgess and Council be and they are hereby required to examine and test the same on a day to be named by the Engineer in Chief of the Fire Department, and that said Chief Engineer shall on the occasion call to his assistance the several fire companies of the Borough to aid in such test, with proper hose &c., for the accomplishment of the same. Also that the citizens of the Borough be invited to be present and witness such test.

The resolution was adopted and the Council adjourned.
