The News Condensed.

The public will be pained to learn that Senator Matt Carpenter is dying.

The Indiana House rejected the bill allowing women to vote for Presidential Electors, by 46 to 43.

Hon. Simon Cameron arrived at Nassau, N. P., on the 8th inst., and will remain a fortnight, and proceed thence to Cuba.

Two hundred and three sailing vessels and sixteen steamers of all nationalities were reported lost during December.

The illness of Wm. H. Vanderbilt, reported resulting from surgical operation for the relief of hemorrhoids is said not to be serious.

The obelisk was formally presented to the city of New York yesterday by Evarts, in behalf of the Khedive. There was a large attendance.

Particulars of the destruction of the United States salmon hatching works on McCloud river during the recent storm by the freshet, places the loss at \$15,000.

Governor Ludlow of New Jersey has vetoed the bill resorting to citizenship Joseph Cornish, sentenced for complicity with the Warren county ring frauds on tax payers.

H. B. Claffin, S. V. White, George I. Seely, Henry R. Bennett, Governor Woodford contributed a hundred dollars each for defraying cadet Whittaker's trial expenses.

While Mrs. O'Donovan Rossa was reading in Northcomb's Hall, Montreal, last Monday night, a bullet was fired through the window and fell in the hall without hitting any one. The miscreant who fired the shot escaped.

The new funding bill does not seem to meet the approval of the banks, and many of them are withdrawing their circulation. The First National of Pittston, is among the first to cancel its notes, amounting to \$450,000.

Hayti advices state that while Prest Solomon was suppressing the projected conspiracy in the South, a plot was discovered in Port AuPrince to fire the executive mansion and assassinate the President. The guard was doubled.

The Arkansas House by 66 to 17 passed a joint resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution prohibiting the sale of liquors in the State. The Senate adopted a joint resolution fixing the pronunciation of the name of the State as "Arkansaw."

In view of the probable final passage of the Funding bill, the First National Bank of Albany yesterday resolved to withdraw \$70,000 of deposited bonds which cover \$67,000 of its circulation. The other banks in that city are considering the propriety of taking similar action.
