The Postmaster General has issued an order revoking the section of postal regulations in force for the past two years, which permitted the transmitting through the mails of commercial paper and blanks filled out in writing, such as invoices, way-bills, bills of Furniture Store to E. B. Pierce I would remerchandise, deeds, insurance policies, etc., at third-class rates, viz: one cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof. All such matter must hereafter be paid at letter rates, three cents per half ounce.

The conductors, baggagemasters and brakemen on the Lehigh Valley trains donned their new uniforms yesterday. The suits are quite becoming; the material is fine navy blue cloth, made up in good style. The conductor's coat is a double-breasted frock, millitary patern, and that of the baggagemaster of much the same appearance, but a sack. The brakeman also wears a sack nearly like that worn by the Pennsylvania R. R. hands. We understand the suits including caps to match, are furnished by the Company without expense to the employes.

The wife of Rev. A. G. STILWELL, of Lynn, Susquehannah county, died on Sunday of last week in consequence of an abnormal growth which was called dropsy. She had been increasing in size for several years and at the time of her death her weight was estimated to be over five hundred pounds. A post mortem examination showed that the flesh over the abdomen was six inches thick and also revealed the presence of about a gallon of dropsical water.

The burial casket was two feet square and eleven pall-bearers were employed. Notwithstanding her enormous weigh she was remarkably active until a short time before her death, and she insisted on performing a considerable part of her household work .- Tunkhannock Republican.
