The President has vetoed the refunding bill.

President Hayes and family leave Washington for Fremont to-day.

The lower house of the Delaware legislature has passed the local option bill by a vote of 11 to 8. It is thought the senate will also pass the bill.

The secret service of Philadelphia reports the arrest of Emile Eisenlohn for passing counterfeit \$5 notes on the National State bank of Troy, N. Y.

It is the opinion of politicians that Cameron or ex-Chief Justice Dixon will be chosen United States Senator to succeed Carpenter. Their chances are about even.

The Mardi Gras procession Tuesday evening in New Orleans was a grand success, and 10,000 visitors were in the city. One woman was shot and one run over by the street cars. Both are expected to die.

William Buffum, a merchant of Friendsville, Pa., committed suicide yesterday morning by shooting himself through the heart. Full particulars not known. The deceased leaves a wife and four children.

The Cleveland, Columbus, Cincinnati and Indianapolis railroad reports that its gross earnings last year show an increase of \$981,000 over 1879, and expenses increased \$300,000. The retiring directors were re-elected.

Misses Maggie Van Bushkirk and Anna Hopper, two leading young ladies of Spring Valley N. Y., were found apparently dead Monday morning, from coal gas. Both were restored to consciousness, and are considered out of danger.
