The nominations were promptly confirmed.

The Danville Insane Asylum Burned.

The State Insane Asylum at Danville, in which several patients from this county were confined, was discovered to be on fire Saturday evening. The institution is located a mile and-a-half out of the city and before the fire companies could reach it the main building and east wing were enveloped in flames and past saving. The fire was stayed before the west wing was destroyed. The fire broke out again yesterday afternoon, but by the aid of firemen from adjoining towns a portion of the west wing was saved.

There were nearly five hundred patients in the institution, all of whom were removed without confusion. A few escaped but were recaptured. The inmates who could not be provided for in the west wing were taken to Harrisburg.

The fire originated in the paint room

and is believed to have been caused by spontaneous combustion.

The steward of the institution, Mr. F. Eyer, is a brother of Mrs. George Stevens of this place.

The building cost \$600,000 and was insured for \$400,000.
