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Alexander III.

The eldest son of Alexander II. died in 1865. The new czar is the second son. The daughter is married to Queen Victoria's second son, the duke of Edinburgh. The new czarina is the princess Maria Dagmar of Denmark, sister to the princess of Wales and the king of Greece. She was engaged to the czar's eldest son, and on his death transferred her affections to his brother. Alexander III, was born March 10, 1845, and was married November 9, 1866. Four children have followed the union. The new czar, according to a sketch in the *Tribune*, while not being quite so tall as his father, is still about six feet in height, and is remarkably deep-chested and broad-shouldered. In St. Petersburg he usually appears most correctly attired in uniform; but when enjoying a holiday among his wife's relatives at Copenhagen—where he is very popular—he is plainly dressed. His career as a soldier is a creditable one, though not brilliant. Two of the things that remind him of his career in the army are a frosbitten hand and a slight scar on his temple, where a bullet grazed his head in one of the battles during the Turkish war. During that war his presence early in the campaign, did much to encourage the Russian troops.

The term of Dr. Wickersham as Superintendent of Public Instruction expired some months ago and he has been holding over to await the pleasure of Governor Hoyt in the appointment of his successor. We do not take this view of the matter, and are inclined to the opinion that if the question were submitted to the people there would be a greater majority in favor of Dr. Wickersham as his own successor in an office which he has filled to everybody's satisfaction and for the promotion of the efficiency of the public school system. Granted, however, that a change must be made, it is not probable that the Governor's choice could have fallen upon a gentleman less open to objection or better fitted for the office than Dr. Higby, and the wisdom of the selection will do much to disarm the criticism which any change would invite.—*Press*.

In a speech at the graduation exercises of Washington Spencian Business College last May, President Garfield said: "Laugh at as we may, put it aside as a jest if we will, keep it out of Congress or political campaigns, still the woman question is rising in our horizon larger than the size of a man's hand; and some solution, ere long, that question must find. I have not yet committed my mind to any formula that embraces the whole question. 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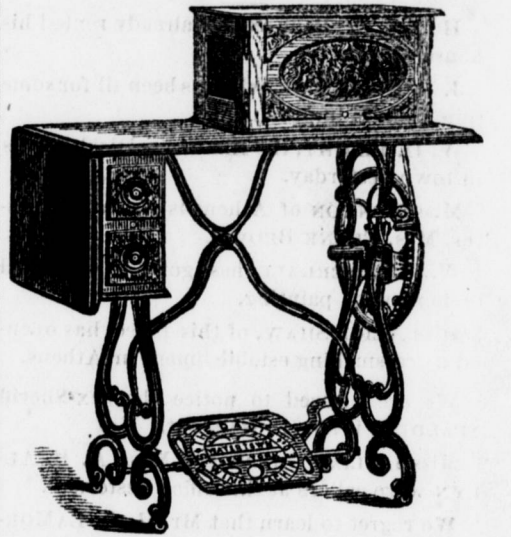
