The News Condensed.

An armistice has been arranged between the British and Boers, and it is believed the war is now ended.

The Rhode Island House of Representatives rejected the Senate resolution of sympathy with Ireland by a vote of 16 to 28.

An express train on the Lake Shore road ran off the track eight miles east of Cleveland last night. The engineer and fireman were killed.

The Savannah River at Augusta, Ga., is higher than it has been since 1865 rising twenty-four feet in twelve hours. A portion of Augusta is flooded.

One of the main features of the gigantic scheme of Philadelphia capitalists is to reclaim the Florida everglades as a ship canal across Florida.

The contract for building the Lackawanna County Court House was awarded to John Snaith, of Ithaca, N. Y., and will cost, when completed, about \$150,000.

A private letter received in San Francisco says: "John W. Mackey has bought out the interests of two Scotchmen who held large blocks of Sutro Tunnel stock. This gives color to the story that the Bonanza firm control the tunnel."

The Irish National Land Industrial League of New York reports collections aggregating \$6,000, since the date of the organization a year ago. At Sunday's meeting in New York and Brooklyn large accessions to its membership were announced.

In New York during the rain storm commencing Saturday morning and continuing until Sunday morning, two inches and sixty-three hundredths of rain fell. The rain fall this month there has been unusually heavy, reaching over six and one half inches.

A private letter from Danville states that the loss by fire in the State Hospital for the Insane near that place, amounts to about four hundred and fifty thousand dollars. There were twenty-two wards, and fourteen of these, with the central building, were destroyed. The structure was very far from being fire proof, and in rebuilding it an effort will be made to correct the mistakes of construction exposed by the fire.
