The position of Commissioner of Indian Affairs has been tendered to ex-Congressman Price, of Iowa. The nomination will be sent in soon to the Senate.

Dr. Julius H. Skilton, for eight years Consul-General in Mexico, states that American trade has increased sixty per cent since 1879 in machinery and hardware.
