The Debt and the Banks.

Some interesting facts in regard to the reduction of the public debt are given by the New York Commercial Advertiser. Mr. McCulloch, Secretary of the Treasury under President Johnson, audited the government's war obligations in four months and found, August 31, 1865, that the total debt was \$2,755,995,000, and the interest charge \$151,000,000 a year. At the close of Mr. Johnson's term his Secretary transferred to the administration of Gen. Grant a debt of \$2,525,000,000, with an interest charge of \$124,000,000 a year. In the eight years of Gen. Grant, his Secretaries, chief of whom was Mr. Boutwell, reduced the principal of the debt to \$2,088,000, and the interest to \$94,400,000; and this was the condition of the public finances when President Hayes took charge, with Mr. Sherman as his Secretary of the Treasury, in 1877. The following four years the principal of the debt was reduced to \$1,879,956,000, and the interest to \$76,845,000 per annum. The actual reduction of interest on the funded stocks, as they stood at the beginning of the term, was \$21,500,000, a new charge of \$4,600,000 per annum being incurred for resumption expenses.

The work of reduction would have gone bravely on, had it not been for Democratic obstinacy and ill will to compel what could not be done. Before the close of the year there would have been a notable reduction of interest charges. As will be seen very much will still be accomplished in that direction by a judicious use of the finances in hand and the permission for bonds to continue to draw three per cent, after they become due, on July 1st. It is estimated that these precautionary measures will reduce the principal of the national debt by \$70,000,000 to \$90,000,000 and the interest by \$10,000,000 to \$12,000,000. Still better would have been accomplished, had the funding bill passed and the Democrats had not been intent on breaking down the National banks. And in all that may be said in favor of the National banks, it should be especially to emphasize their efficiency in acting as agencies in promoting the public welfare. Their benefit to the government and community at large needs no argument. No man of sense and not of warped prejudices disputes the assertion, What a better system is demanded or other exigencies arise, on the payment of the debt and outstanding bonds, then will be the proper time for discussion of other or preferable systems of currency circulation. But while there is no better currency, let the National banks be sustained.

The Rev. I. T. Walker, who has just completed his pastorate in Binghamton, gets this complimentary "send off" from the Republican: "The influence of a faithful minister of the gospel in the community in which he lives is like the quality of mercy; 'it droppeth as the gentle rain from heaven upon the place beneath, and it blesses him that gives and him that takes.' It does not go forth with blare of trumpets or clang of cymbal to proclaim its virtues or demand its reward; but, by kind and helpful words, by gentle and unselfish deeds, by a broad spirit of brotherhood, by a pure and consistent life it elevates the moral tone of the community and sows the seeds of everlasting life in hundreds of doubting and unbelieving hearts. Such is the influence which the Rev. I. T. Walker has executed here for the past three years. He leaves behind him the record of a broad and charitable ministry, and takes with him the blessing of all who know him.
