NEW YORK, APRIL, 1881.

The late Spring comes to us with ample provision for every material requirement. Dealers and buyers are alike delighted, and the streets and stores present a scene of glowing beauty and activity.

Dress goods cover the entire ground of possibility in the matter of color, texture and combination. Hats run a gamut of grades and sizes from one extreme to the other. One can scarcely go astray, either in the class of article, or in the fashion of its make or trimming. It is the specialties of commerce upon which the public mind is most frequently exercised.
