WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.—The annual meeting of the Towanda District of the Women's Foreign Missions Society, Presbytery of Lackawanna, was held in this place yesterday. Delegates and guests were present from Athens, Barclay, Canton, Montroeton, Stevensville, Sayre, Towanda, Troy, Wyalusing and Waverly. Miss LORING, President of the Lackawanna Presbyterial Society, and Mrs. Doctor KNOX, of Elmira, were present. At 9:30 a. m. a devotional meeting was held, led by Mrs. KNOX, and at 10 o'clock the meeting was called to order for business. After singing the doxology and prayer the routine business was transacted, followed by addresses by Miss LORING and Mrs. KNOX, an essay by Miss COOK, and singing by Mrs. BALDWIN. The session was closed by repeating the Lord's prayer in concert.

An elegant lunch prepared by the Towanda members was spread in the church parlors and after partaking the members were again called to order and enjoyed a pleasant and profitable afternoon session in listening to the president's address, a talk on Japan, by Mrs. KNOX, an address to the "bands" by Miss LORING, reports from auxiliaries and committee, singing by Mrs. BALDWIN, etc. About 350 ladies were present.

In the evening Rev. A. L. OSTRANDER of Owego delivered a very interesting lecture descriptive of what he saw in Turkey. By way of illustration, a number of young gentlemen arrayed in oriental costumes were introduced to afford a better idea of the manners and customs of Constantinople. We regret that we are unable to do the lecturer justice by giving a synopsis of his admirable address, which was listened to with wrapt attention to the close by the entire audience.—At quite a late hour the meeting was brought to a close, after a few appropriate remarks by Doctor STEWART, by the congregation rising and singing that grand old missionary hymn, "From Greenland's icy mountains."

The report of the secretary of the Society shows a membership of 282 and contributions amounting to \$621.53.

The church was beautifully and artistically decorated with dried grasses, which were greatly admired by all. This was the work of Miss HELEN CARTER.

The News Condensed.

Lord Beaconsfield is slightly better.

The Ohio Republican State Convention will be held at Cleveland on June 8th.

The Republican State Convention of this State, will be held at Harrisburg, September 8th.

Governor Hoyt is confined to his house by illness and is threatened with an attack sciatica.

There have been 1,014 horses shipped by railway from Montreal to the States the past month.

Ohio Democrats are a good deal disappointed because Governor Foster of Ohio won't go abroad. They want him out of the way in October.

A London dispatch says the steamer James Harris, an English coaster, was sunk in a collision last night and fourteen persons drowned.

All the Nihilists concerned in the assassination of the Czar, except Hessa Helfmann, will be hanged to-day. Russakoff and Michaeloff have sued the Czar for mercy.

A number of Nihilists attacked the soldiers who were keeping guard over the condemned assassins of the Czar, and twenty of them were arrested with bombs in their possession.

Sergeant Bates, who marched through the Southern States and some parts of Europe, bearing the American flag, is dying at Saybrook, Ill., in abject poverty. He has a wife and six children.

Governor Ordway, of Dakota, was in Washington yesterday, and called upon the President and Secretary Lincoln to urge the importance of immediate assistance to the citizens of Dakota, who have been rendered homeless by the recent disastrous floods. He wants government rations issued.

It is said that a powerful syndicate of bankers is forming to buy up all the sixes in the market, to get the benefit of the probable rise in price, believing that they can secure nearly all the bonds not already controlled by the banks before May 10th. The effect of this will be that very few bonds will be extinguished under Secretary Windom's circular.
