### The News Condensed.

Hon. Milo Goodrich, a leading member of the bar, and an ex-Congressman, died yesterday at Auburn, N. Y., aged 65.

It is said that the will of Eben Wright, of Boston, who left \$2,000,000 to Mrs. Whittier, will be contested by the relatives of Wright.

The late Stephen Stockwell, of Boston, made bequests, amounting to \$130,000, to be divided among nine religious benevolent institutions.

Yesterday John Brown obtained a verdict of seven thousand dollars against the Long Island Railway for injuries sustained from a train running off the track.

The Texas Pacific RR., will be completed to Colorado, two hundred and sixty-three miles west of Dalas, Texas, to-day. Freight trains will begin running Monday and passenger trains as soon time card can be changed.

In the case of Miss Mary Murra vs, Gen. E. B. Tayler, Postmaster of Baltimore, for \$20,000 damages, for an alleged indecent assault while the plaintiff was an employ in the post office, the jury rendered a verdict in favor of the plaintiff, awarding \$5,000 damages.

The consular reports received in Washington show that the efforts now being made in Europe to create a prejudice against American pork and ham, are due to the fears of business men that the protracted heavy drain of gold from the Old World to the United States, may eventually result in a serious disturbance of the monetary balance between the two hemispheres.

Preston Holloway, seven feet and nine inches tall, weighing 550 pounds, and Andrew Walker, seven feet and nine and one-half inches tall, weighing 500 pounds, had a prize fight at Charlotte, N. C. The contest lasted over an hour and both were badly punished. Finally Walker knocked Holloway senseless and the latter gave up the fight.

Bradstreet's mercantile agency reports the number of failures during the past week at 106, the lowest record in several months. In various portions of the country there is a marked increase in activity and a larger volume of trade.

James O'Brien alias Robert Lindsey, who swore that he knew H. L. Morey, to whom the Morey-Garfield-anti-Chinese letter purported to have been written, confessed perjury Thursday and was sentenced to eight years in prison. So far so good. That will do for the perjury. Now then, the public want to hear from the forger; and after that, from those who were *particeps criminis* in the affair. M. O'Brien-Lindsey, or whatever his name is, is too small a toad in the puddle to answer for a scape-goat for all the big ones.

An order will soon be issued by the Postmaster-General, declaring that all publications issued in violation of the copyrights granted by the United States, are unailable matter. The question was brought to the attention of the Department several weeks ago by Mr. Clemens, (Mark Twain), who complained that certain publishers in Canada were reprinting one of his works there and disposing of it in the United States at a price below that charged by the American publishers.
