A Remarkable Case of Childbirth:

The Hazleton *Sentinel* of Saturday is responsible for the following: The residents of South Wyoming street were somewhat startled yesterday afternoon by the announcement that Mrs. Daniel Thomas, a resident of Hollywood, who with her husband came to town to do some shopping, had given birth to four children. On investigation the following facts in this remarkable case were gleaned by the reporter of the *Sentinel*: Mrs. Thomas is the mother of five children, all of which were born at regular intervals, singly, and her general health has always been considered good. Yesterday she complained to her husband after their arrival in town, stating that she was unwell, but at the same time gave no sign or symptom that any thing serious was about to happen, but her husband, who is thoughtful and considerate, concluded that when they got through shopping he would arrange to have a conveyance to take them home. With other purchases, Mrs. Thomas went to the store of John B. Brown, on South Wyoming street, and while standing at the counter she was taken ill instantly, and before the women who came to her aid, could remove her up stairs, she gave birth to twins, and after the arrival of Drs. Cole, Casselberry and Deitz, who were hastily summoned to attend, she gave birth to two other children. This is the first case of quadruple birth in Hazleton we have been called upon to note. All were still born, and at last accounts Mrs. Thomas was in a fair way of recovery, and is being tenderly cared for by her friends and physicians.

These figures will illustrate the care with which the U. S. Treasury is guarded: There were rejected, branded and returned to the owners during the fiscal year \$3,610 in counterfeit United States notes, \$3,842 in counterfeit national bank notes, \$770 10 in counterfeit fractional currency. Of the counterfeit bank notes rejected \$1,200 were in notes of the denomination of \$100 purporting to be of the issue of the following national banks: First National Bank of Boston, \$300; National Revere Bank of Boston, \$300; Central National Bank of New York, \$100; and Pittsburg National Bank of Commerce of Pittsburg, \$500. These counterfeits are all printed from the same original plate, and are by far the most difficult of detection of any which have yet appeared. Fortunately the person by whom the plate was engraved has been recently arrested, and it is hoped that the further printing or putting in circulation of counterfeits printed from it will be prevented. There were also rejected \$7,870 25 in stolen, pieced and fragmentary national bank notes. There was deducted on account of mutilations from the face value of United States notes redeemed during the fiscal year, \$10,157; from fractional currency, \$330 73; and from notes of failed, liquidating and reducing banks, \$80; making the total deductions to the close of the fiscal year \$297,363 76 on notes of the face value of \$3,229,368,462 17 redeemed.

The Treasury has increased the bullion fund at the New York assay office by \$15,000,000 in gold coin, to pay for the foreign gold bullion and coin. There is now at the New York assay office and Philadelphia mint nearly \$90,000,000 in gold bullion. This is enough to keep the Philadelphia mint constantly employed for fifteen months. It is estimated that the importation of foreign gold for the current year will reach \$100,000,000. The domestic product will greatly add to the amount of gold in the United States.

DISSOLUTION.—The partnership heretofore existing between Saml. Woodford and Jno. VanDorn under the firm name of Woodford & VanDorn, is this day dissolved by mutual consent.
