The New Second Assistant Postmaster General.

While the appointment of Mr. K. AL-LISON ELMER, of Waverly to the responsible and honorable position of Second Assistant Postmaster General, is one of the very best that could have been made, his selection is a refutation of the newspaper allegation that there is bitter enmity between the New York Senators and President GARLIELD. Mr. ELMER is one of the most intimate friends and ardent supporters of Senator Platt and without doubt his appointment was made at the instance of that Senator. Mr. PLATT possesses the rare quality among politicians at least, of remembering and rewarding his friends. In this respect as in many others he resembles Gen. CAMERON of this State. Such men are deservedly popular. We confidently predict that THOMAS C. PLATT will make one of the very best Senators the Empire State has ever had, and that his ability and usefulness will give him a national reputation, while the many noble traits of head and heart will always find for him a warm place in the hearts of those who have the honor to know him personally.

A great Polar watering place is among the possibilities of the future. The Canadians are about building a railroad, the Hyperborean Pacific, from Lake Winnepeg to Fort Churchill on Hudson's Bay, a distance of three hundred and fifty miles. The route was explored last summer and pronounced feasible. The cost is estimated at \$12,000 per mile. It could not be operated more than five months of a year, but in that period, great quantities of grain could be taken from the Red River country to a port on the Hudson's Bay, thence to be taken in steamships direct to Great Britain without breaking bulk, thus saving largely in transportation charges. This consideration will influence the building of the railroad more than the fact that it might be a conveyance to a summer watering place of the coolest possible conditions.
