VENNOR has issued his weather prognostications for May. He says: Towards the end of the first week, or about the 5th or 6th, snow may be looked for in the lower provinces of Canada, and about May 3 frosts are probable in central or southern Illinois, with rain and snow prevailing in some localities. There will also, in all probability, be snow-falls through the gulf and the St. Lawrence district about the 7th and 8th. After the 10th however, hot weather may be expected, and after the 15th brush fires may be expected to break out in certain districts, although thunder storms are probable on the 13th and 15th. Between the 20th and 25th there will probably be cloudy weather with rains, and vegetation will have advanced considerably by the 24th of the month. Between the 20th and 25th the weather will probably be cool. The month will end hot and sultry.

For quite a number of years past the authorities of the State have charged Bradford county with a certain sum to be assessed and collected as a State tax. Three years ago our Commissioners became satisfied that the assessment was too high and illegal in form, and in 1873-9-80 the amount was paid under protest. Last year proceedings were commenced against the Commonwealth to recover the overpayment of 1878 and for adjustment of the claim for 1879. Under date of April 5th, the Commissioners were advised by the Auditor-General that a decision had been made in favor of our county, and that the county was entitled to recover the sum of \$3,919.22 from the State Treasury. Our Board of Commissioners, and their clerk, WM LEWIS, Esq., are entitled to much praise for their prudence and carefulness in looking after the interests of the county.—Reporter.
