
A flagrant instance of Star route irregularities 1s furnished by the route from St. Paul, to St. Louis on the Mississippi river. Prominent postal officers protested against the establishment of the route, declaring it was already covered and the mails would only be delayed by the new route. It is alleged \$71,000 a year was paid for transporting empty pouches on this route.

The excess of exports of merchandise for March was \$24,364,000; last year \$6,-464,000; for the nine months ended March \$234,855,000; for last year \$159,082,000; for twelve months \$243,446,000; last year \$194,472,000. Excess of imports in gold and silver in March was \$6,445,000; last year \$106,000: nine months ended March \$78,623,000; last year \$75,671,000; twelve months \$78,943.000; last year \$70,773,000.

Ex-Senator Dorsey has written to Postmaster General James, requesting him to make an investigation in his presence of every contract with which his name has been connected, so that James will be enabled to give him in writing the true status of each case. Dorsey asks that the request be granted at once that he may not rest under injurious and injust imputations, or be unnecessarily detained from business to defend reputation against base and unfounded assaults.

The "Mississippi plan" is bearing its legitimate fruit. The price of labor has advanced and the value and rent of lands have proportionately decreased in that State. The colored people no longer place any reliance on the smooth talk of the planters and the exodus is beginning to be felt' in the scarcity of labor. Possibly the necessity which knows no law may yet compel a more decent treatment of the colored men by the white people of that State.

Col. Robert G. Ingersoll has just closed a series of Sunday evening lectures in the New York Academy of Music. In those lectures he has boldly assaulted every form of religious belief, denied the existance of the God of the Christain, and crucified afresh the Saviour of mankind.
