Old-man-not-afraid-of-the-Bosses, is the honorable title given President Garfield by intelligent aborigines.

The people of Pennsylvania now wait to see how their Senators at Washington will act in the matter at issue between the President and Senator Conkling. Almost to a man they support the rights and dignity of the Presidential office. Will our Senators be true representatives of their State or not?

Four poor Philadelphia housewives joined in the purchase of a whole barrel of flour, and found it considerable cheaper than their previous practice of buying a few pounds at a time. They extended the plan to other supplies, and then to additional members. Next they hired a room and a woman to superintend the purchases and distribution. Fifty families now get all their groceries through this association at the lowest wholesale prices.

Candidates for the several county offices to be filled this fall begin to perambulate the county. Somehow these gentlemen who have generally reposed implicit faith in the power of certain "bosses" to put them through regardless of the will of the people, begin to lose confidence in the ability to fulfil all their contracts. The Republican party is strong enough to insist on the nomination of good men, and we think the rank and file will assert their prerogatives regardless of previous contracts by self-constituted agents.

Joseph Black, a partner of Congressman Harmer, Joseph Funk, J. Blackman, and W. R. Cason were arraigned in Philadelphia Saturday on a charge of complicity in scheme to defraud the Government by straw bids for mail contracts. A large number of witnesses were examined. It was shown that bonds were executed in Black's office. Black acknowledged that he was a contractor and the other prisoners bid for him in order that proper security might be entered. He stated that he was able and willing to indemnify the Government for any loss. All the accused were held in \$5,000 each for a further hearing Monday.

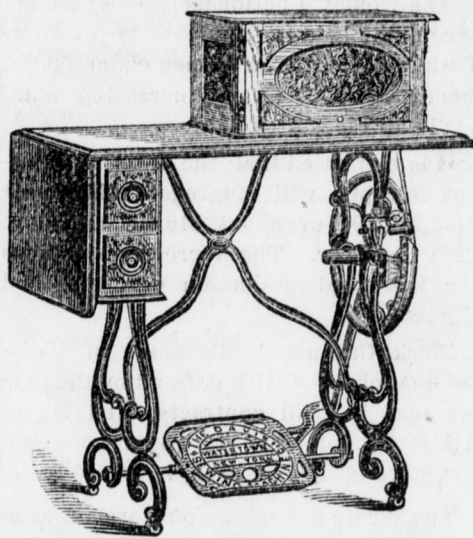
Mr. A. Forsythe of Valley Falls, Kansas, smokes with a great degree of pride a pipe presented to him by General U. S. Grant in 1863 in Mississippi, after the battle of Port Gibson when on the march to Vicksburg. It is a small china pipe, on which is painted two Union flags and an appropriate patriotic motto. Mr. Forsythe served with General Grant in the Mexican War, and perhaps is the oldest soldier in the country, having served three years in the English army, through the Mexican War, and all through the late Civil War.

The Tribune concludes an article on Senator Conkling's untenable position in his relation to the President in these judicious words:

The plain truth is that, in opposing the confirmation of Mr. Robertson, Senator Conkling is at issue with the great majority of Republicans of New York. Even many of the journals which advocated the nomination of General Grant as earnestly as the Tribune opposed it, dissent from the course of Senator Conkling, and therein represent the feelings of a majority of those who have been his supporters. The question is asked very significantly by an Albany paper: "Does Mr. Conkling ever receive telegrams in cipher? Did he receive one not long ago? Trans-

lated did it read: 'I think the nomination of Judge Robertson should be promptly confirmed for the healing and good of the party?' Did Mr. Conkling resent this as an endeavor to teach him the 'A B C' of his duty? Whether these hints have foundation in fact or not, it is an open secret that Governor Cornell, the official head of the Republican party in this state has not appeared impatient to see the Legislature rescind its resolutions approving the nomination of Mr. Robertson. Republican Senators at Washington may rest assured that the Republican party of this State does not desire to frighten or to bully them into antagonism with the President. On the contrary the great majority of the Republicans of New York feel that the President has sought to act justly and fairly toward all classes of his supporters, and that he ought to be sustained in that endeavor.
