
Four poor Philadelphia housewives. joined in the purchase of a whole barrel of flour, and found it considerable cheaper than their previous practice of bnying a few pounds at a time. They extended the plan to other supplies, and then to additional members. Next they hired a room and a woman to superintend the purchases and distribution. Fifty families now get all their groceries through this association at the lowest wholesale prices.

Candidates for the several county offices to be filled this fall begin to perambulate the county. Somehow these gentlemen who have generally reposed implicit faith ln the power of certain "bosses" to yut them through regardless of the will of the people, begin to lose confidence in the ability to fulfil all all their contracts. The Republican party is strong enough to insist on the nomination of good men, and we think the rauk and file will assert their prerogatives regardless of previous contracts by selfconstituted agents.

Joseph Black, a partner of Congressman Harmer, Joseph Funk, J. Blackman, and W. R. Cason were arrainged in Philadelpeia Saturday on a charge of complicity in scheme to defraud the Government by straw bids for mail contracts. A large number of witnesses were examined. It was shown that bonds were executed in Black's office. Black acknowledged that he was a contractor and the other prisoners bid for him in order that proper security might be entered. He stated that he was adle and willing to indemnify the Government for any loss. All the accused were held in \$5,000 each for a further hearing Monday.

Mr. A. Forsythe of Valley Falls, Kansas, smokes with a great degree of pride a pipe presented to him by General U. S. 
