The steamboat Lyman Truman, recently purchased in Owego by a Wilkesbarre company to ply between that city and Nanticoke, proves to be too heavy draught. Yesterday's *Union-Leader* says:

The new steamer "Tremaine" which was lately purchased by Plymouth parties for use on the river here, ran aground again yesterday on an up trip and her passengers were transferred in squads to the little "Clipper" and carried back to Plymouth. It is to be regretted that so large and handsome a vessel, which must have cost a pretty good sum of money, is rendered useless a large part of the season by reason of her heavy draught. Yesterday the water in the Susquehanna was three feet higher than it usually is during the long dry season, and yet she could not navigate. This undoubtedly proves that the vessel is a failure here, and her owners certainly will have the sympathy of the community in the loss which must necessarily follow so unfortunate an investment."

The question whether tags on samples of merchandise containing figures indicating price and width are mailable as fourth-class matter was recently brought to the attention of the post-office department by some leading dry goods firms in New York, Boston and other points. The ruling of the department upon this question will be found embodied in the following general order, which has just been issued by Postmaster General JAMES: "Tags or labels attached to samples of merchandise may have the price and width of the goods printed thereon, either by the original impression or by a hand stamp, filling in blanks left by the original print. This will not authorize such use of a hand-stamp for any other purpose than as a description of the thing attached. It cannot be used to convey information personal in its nature or disconnected from the thing to which the matter so stamped is attached, except at rates for first-class matter. The width of the article of which a sample is given may be stated in writing, but when so written, the purpose of identification being held to have been accomplished as authorized by the statute, the price of the article cannot be added, either in writing or imprint, without changing the classifications of the matter to letter rates."
