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Don't Re-elect Them.

EDITORS OF THE REVIEW: We intimated in our last that Conkling and Platt would probably be their own successors, as they evidently expected to be. But we now predict that a "change will come over the spirit of their dreams" before the week elapses. We believe we greatly misjudge the people of New York if they do not influence their Legislature to defeat the "bulldozing" ex-Senators. Conkling's resignation, which he supposed would explode like a bomb-shell in the administration camp, has, like the Australian native's boomerang, reflected back and fell at his own feet where it is likely to blow up his own political prospects, and Mr. Platt's also. We sincerely hope that the New York Legislature will send TWO MEN to the U. S. Senate, and that they will not re-elect a man whose evident intention is to make war on the administration for the next four years, and who would not hesitate to destroy the Republican party to accomplish his ends.

The Elmira Advertiser, which has been one of the warmest supporters of Senator Conkling, has come to the conclusion that the Republicans of the Empire State do not desire the re-election of Conkling and Platt, and frankly admits that their conduct in resigning is inexcusable and damaging to the Republican cause. The REVIEW took this view of the situation in the outset. In common with a vast majority of the Republicans of the country, we were sorry to see the New York Senators vacate their seats. We could see no possible benefit to themselves by such a course even should the legislature return them, for the reason that the same legislature had passed a vote of thanks to President Garfield for appointing Judge Robertson, and no effort had been made to rescind it. We repeat, we are sorry to have our country deprived of the service of two such able men as Conkling and Platt, but they have voluntarily chosen to commit political suicide. We do not censure them for opposing the confirmation of Robertson. They had a right to vote as they pleased upon the question. But they had no right whatever to throw up their trust from the Republicans of New York, to desert the Republicans and the Independents of the South, and to leave the control of the Senate in Democratic hands, because they could not have his own way about one office.

The Association which has for its object the due observation of the two-hundredth anniversary of the founding of our State by William Penn, is making arrangements looking to the assembling of a grand mass meeting on the coming 4th of July at the Permanent Exhibition building in Fairmount Park. The Association is arranging with railroad companies for very reduced excursion rates on that day, and it is expected that an immense demonstration will take place.

The Treasurership seems to be the great bone of contention among Republican aspirants for nominations in this county, this year. Kileon says the "bosses" have promised to put him through, but he begins to fear they are not going to be able to "hold their men." Perhaps the people will have something to say about the matter.

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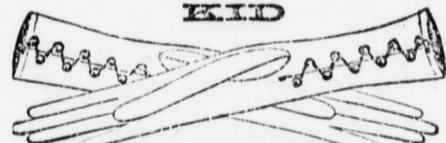
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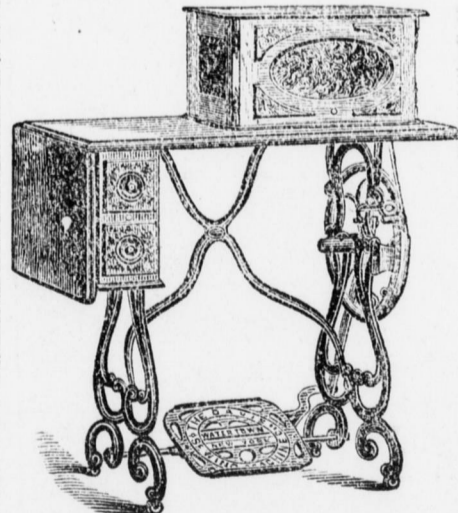
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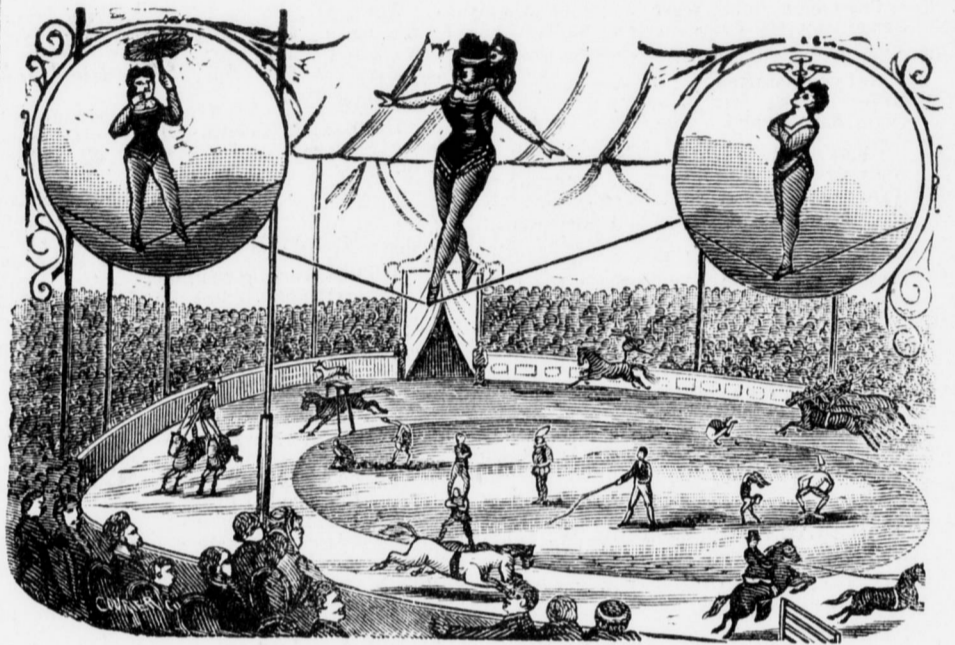
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
