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Jefferson Davis has written a letter reluctantly declining an invitation to be present at the unveiling of a monument to the unknown Confederate dead in Frederick county, Md., on the 2 nd of June He seizes the occasion to say : am truly gratefnl to your association for this enduring mark with which you honor the brave men who sleep their last sleep in the soil of Maryland. They died not for our cause, but for the cause of mankiad, their lives_being a sacrifice to constutional liberty, the right of a people to govern themselves." Jefferson is certainly growing humorous in his old age. The people of the South had everything pretty much their own way up to the time of the election of Abraham Lincoln, and then, because the North beat them with the ballot they appealed to the bullet. That sort of "constitutional liberty" is good.
The executers of the late hereditary Princess Caroline of Denmark found $r$ cently an old chest in the lumber-room, which not even the oldest servants remembered ever seen opened, and as no keys were found which fitted the lock, the lid was forced and to the surprise of everyone, the box contained a rich collection of furs, loose brilliants, pearl and diamond necklaces, velvets, pieces of richly embroidered satin, canes and riding whips with handles of beautifully chiselled gold and silver inlaid with precious stones, gold cups, and in short a quantity of valuables worth many thousands of dollars. Apparently the existance of this treasure had been entirely forgotten by the late Princess.
Senator Logan said to the Postmaster General the other day: "James, I hope you will probe this Star route corruption to the bottom. Never mind who it touches; don't mind either, those who cry out that the investigation wili hurt the party. Reform never ruins. Twenty thousand, one hundred and seveaty-eight immigrants arrived in New Yotk last week, the best record for a month. It is probably that the record for the month will exceed the total for the year 1878 , nearly 80,000 .

The holder of the belt for which the pe destrians contested last week in New York, refuses to give it to Vint, on the ground that he paid Hughes $\$ 500$ for it. A band of counterfeiters have been arrested at Geneva, Switzerland, who have accomplices at Alexandria, Egypt, and in France. They have put $2.000,000$ francs of false Egyptian money into circulation. The Council of the Reformed Episcopal Church approved the calling of a temperance convention at Saratoga, June 21st, and requests the co-operation of all persons to prevent the alarming spread of intemperance.
Mr Fawcett, the blind Postmaster Genearl of England, has decided to give employment to a number of deaf and dumb persons in the department devoted to the sorting of newspapers.
