We observe that the friends of our genial old friend, Ezra Ratty, of North Towanda, contemplate presenting his name to the Republican County Convention, this fall, as a candidate for the nomination for the office of County Commissioner. The name of a better man for the position will not be presented to that assemblage. Ezra's avoirdupois brings down the scales at about 240 pounds, but his generosity and good nature tips the beam at something like four tons,—more or less. Ezra was a true and tried soldier in the late "onpleasantness,"—having been a member of the famous One Hundred and Forty-First Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers, from the time it entered the service until it returned with decimated ranks, but with undying honor and fame, won on more than half a hundred fields of battle. From the inception of the Republican Party, Ezra has been an active, earnest and efficient worker for the spread of its principles and success of its candidates.
