BACCHALAUREATE SERMON.—The annual sermon before the graduating class of the Susquehanna Collegiate Institute, was delivered Sunday evening by **Rev. C. H. WRIGHT** and was briefly referred to yesterday morning. The text was **Mat. II—1, 2 and 11**. Before the theme of the discourse was announced a brief account of the wise men and magicians of olden time was given. Their avocation and position in society was clearly explained. The wise men of the East held the highest rank in the great Persian empire.—They were careful students; they were the most profound thinkers; they were the best men of their time. It was these men who first did homage to our Saviour.

The subject of the discourse was "The Magi, or the action of true philosophy." First, true philosophy seeks after Christ. The Ma-

gi with their superhuman science perceived that the promised Messiah was about to appear and they immediately set forth to find him. It was a long and weary way, but they were not discouraged by difficulties, they did not go in uncertainty for the bright star went before and pointed out the way. Secondly, true philosophy finds Christ. The magi personifying true philosophy sought out and found Him who was to take upon Himself the sins of the world. Thirdly, true philosophy worships Jesus. The wise men when they had found the object of their search, worshipped it. All culture without religion is dead. Intellectualism tends to atheism.—One can have all the education and intellectual acquirements of earth, but unless he acknowledges God in all things these acquirements will avail him nothing.

Fourthly, true philosophy brings its treasures to God. The wise men brought the most costly treasures to the Saviour, gold, frankincense and myrrh. So all true culture will bring to the Author of all good the treasures it has acquired.

Space will not permit us to go into the details of the excellent sermon. It was ably written and earnestly and impressively delivered. All who heard the discourse could not but feel that they were instructed and made better by it.

A disastrous hail and wind storm was experienced in Dakota yesterday.

Postmaster **Isaac Moorehead**, of Erie, died Sunday. He was unexpectedly appointed by the President about a year ago.

The **Dwyer Brothers** have sold Bramble to General Huntington for \$5,000, and he will be sent to Nashville to perpetuate the Bonny Scott blood.

Senator **Edmunds** is reported as saying in New York that the administration and the Republicans North should do everything they can to help the Mahone movement in Virginia.

Frank Winker of Starke county, Ohio, has, with his five brothers and a sister, fallen heir to \$45,000,000, left by a brother who was a diamond merchant at the Cape of Good Hope.

Lorillard has matched **Sachem** against **Dwyer Brother's Onondaga**, distance three-quarters of a mile, for \$5,000 a side. The race will come off at Jerome Park on Saturday, 25th inst.

Here **Hyacinth** sails from France for the United States in September, having been invited by members of different churches to give a series of conferences in the larger cities in this country.

The saving of a yearly interest of \$10,000,000 is doing pretty well for an administration which came into existence less than three months ago, but is what Secretary **Windom** has already accomplished.
