General Rusk, confirmed as Charge d' Affaires to Uruguay and Paraguay, declines the appointment. This is the second time the appointment has been refused during the Administration.

A young lady who was present at the opening of the Newport Skating Ring the other night added to her many attractions a novel feature. It consisted in what might be called living jewels. Encircling her hat was a cordon of live tropical insects, whose eyes shone with a splendor exceeding the radiance of the most brilliant gems.

The Supreme Court has affirmed the decision of the Dauphin County court taxing building associations. The decision affects all the associations in the State, and will require the payment by each of the several associations in this county of from six hundred to a thousand dollars. There are four in the county.

The Texas Pacific sues the Northern Pacific of New Mexico, to recover 130 miles of railroad built upon the former's land grant, and used by the latter. The amount involved is five millions. This is claimed to be the largest suit ever brought before the U. S. Court.

A Buffalo dispatch announces that the robbery of \$60,000 to \$100,000 in bonds from the Erie County Savings Bank has just been discovered. The bonds were carelessly laid on the treasurer's desk, after a number of the coupons were cut off. A number have been traced to Baltimore.

The curiosity excited as to how many immigrants would come to Castle Garden during the month of May has at length been satisfied—the prodigious total is

76,652. This makes an average of nearly 2,500 a day for the month, and, of course it surpasses anything before known in the country, being greater than some entire years of immigration. The influx represents, among other things, a certain proportion of men and women saved from becoming food for powder for kings and kaisers.
