A FORMER TOWANDA FAMILY AFFLICTED.—We take the following account of the accidental drowning of Master LLOYD, only son of our former townsman, S. N. ASPINWALL, Esq., from the Hastings, (Minn.), Daily News, of June 4. The lad visited in this place with his parents last year. The bereaved family have the hearty condolence of their many friends in this community:

Yesterday afternoon about half past three o'clock, the alarm was raised that Lloid Aspinwall, the nine year old son of S. N. Aspinwall, of the Foster House, had fallen into the river from the fire engine pier at the foot of Ramsey street, and was drowned. The entire circumstances relative to the sad calamity are wrapped in mystery and for ever will be. Only a short time before the alarm, Lloyd went into the dining room of the hotel, and asked for a lump of sugar, which was given him by one of the girls. He then ran out, and that was the last seen of him alive. The first instance relative to his drowning, is recorded by one George Oakes, a young man, a laborer on the wheat barge at Van Inwegen's elevator. Oakes informed us that having no work to do yesterday afternoon, he was leisurely walking down the railroad track, when he noticed two small arms extended from the surface of the water and almost immediately disappear. At the same time he saw a straw hat floating on the water. Marshall Lloyd claims to have been a witness of the same circumstance across the river, and he immediately repaired in a boat to this side, and did all within his power to find the body. Marshall says that when he noticed the arms extended from the water apparently for the last time, there were several men on the railway track, and had they had courage enough to have made the attempt Lloyd could have been saved. On the other hand, Oakes claims there was not another person in sight when he noticed the affair, but he soon saw two or three men and called to them. They secured the hat, which proved to be Lloyd's, and by this only were the parents of Lloyd convinced that it was he that was drowned. It would appear that Lloyd, immediately after leaving the hotel, went down alone and unseen to the river and by some mishap fell in. Mr. Swingler and Marshall Lloyd got out boats and commenced dragging for the body, but at a late hour last night they had not secured it. It is apparent that there was a careless indifference manifested by the men on this side the river who were first witnesses of the tragedy. If they had possessed even the courage to have shouted for help, Lloyd might have been saved.

Lloyd was an unusually bright little fellow, "smart as a whip," being the title unanimously bestowed upon him. He was a great favorite with the guests of the hotel and the idol of his home. Always a leader among his many playmates, he will be missed from their circle with a sadness that will only grow deeper as they grow older and never surrender from their tender hearts where it is now engrained.

His parents and sisters will have the deepest sympathy of Hastings in their affliction.
