The news from Ireland still continues to be very exciting.

A dispatch announces that the Cornell crew will be admitted to the Heney regatta.

Boston capitalists have subscribed five million dollars towards the construction of an air line from Winnipeg to Duluth.

An earthquake has just devastated thirty-four villages in the Pashalic of Van' in Turkish Armenia. We have no particulars.

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company paid \$15,000,000 to Boston parties for the Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore Railroad stock, recently purchased.

The directors of the Pennsylvania Railroad Wednesday, ratified the contract with the Wabash, St. Louis & Pacific Railroad and the Central Railroad of New Jersey.

The London Times, referring to the state of affairs in Russia, says: "Never were there so many political prisoners, less stability, and greater anxiety with no signs of returning calm."

Six persons were killed in the great Quebec conflagration, and the loss is estimated at over \$2,000,000. The fire broke out anew yesterday and it is feared still more damage will ensue.

The strawberry crop on Long Island, which promised to be large, is threatened with destruction by a minute worm. At the east end whole fields are ruined, and several extensive growers lose heavily.
