### Some Interesting Facts and Figures.

Thee following series of paragraphs prepared by a competant gentleman to be printed successively in the REVIEW, will present a brief statistical view of the United States. This presentation of facts is taken from the most recent and authentic sources of information, the official reports of the Treasury Department brought down to February 11th, of the current year, issued by the late Secretary of the Treasury and published within a few days. A series of digests of this sort is intended to outline the financial, industrial, commercial, religious, educational. agricultural, and topographical condition of the country. It includes the leading facts concerning the Revenue and Expenditures of the Government, Debts, Duties, Imposts, Banks, Circulation, Currency, Coinage, Bullion, Exports, Imports, Home Consumption, Emigration, Marine Tonnage, Areas and Acreage, Postoffices and Post Routes, Population, Schools and Colleges, Religious Institutions, Railways, Minerals, Crops, &c. These facts will be found interesting and important and well worth preserving.

REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES.

The Third Annual Historical Abstract of the United States issued by the Treaury Department under date of February 11,1881, contains the following interestfacts: The gross revenues of the United States have increased from \$51,987,455.43 for the year 1862 to \$333,526,610.98 for 1880. The highest amount of public revenue during the intervening period was \$558,032,620.06 for 1866. The expenditures rose from \$406,398,092.80 for 1862 to \$1,297,555,224.44 in 1865, falling to \$267,642,957.78 for 1880. The gross receipts of the Treasury in 1856 were \$74,-056,899.24, and rose to \$1,805,939,345.43 in 1866, falling to \$545,340,713.98 for 1880. The gross expenditures for 1856 were \$72,726,341.57 and reached the sum of \$1,906,433,331.37 for 1865, falling to \$700,233,138.19 for 1880.

### DEBT.

The total interest bearing debt at the out break of the war was \$90,380,873.95 (1861); reached the sum of \$2,381,530,-294.96 for the fiscal year ending August 1st, 1865; and stands at the close of 1880 \$1,723,993,100.00. The annual interest charge for 1861 was \$5,092,620.43; for 1865 it stood \$150,977,697.87; and for 1830, \$79,633,981.00. 
