Some Interesting Facts and Figures.

(Continued.)
EMIGRATION.

The total emigration of this country for the year '80, was 347,747, an increase of over 125 per cent over the previous year; a total of 2,261,904 from the year 1871 to '80, inclusive. Of this there is credited to the British Isles 984,908, to Ireland 436,706, Scotland 87,564, Wales 6,631, Germany 718,182, Sweden 115,922, Austria 63,000, Norway 95,353, Switzerland 55,100, France 72,201, Hungary 9,960, the Netherlands 16,541, Denmark 31,771, Spain 5,266, Portugal 4,627, Italy 55,100, Belgium 7,221, Russia in Europe, 38,837, Poland 12,970, from Asia 123,838, from America 494,024—a grand total (with several nationalities not specified) of 2,812,191 for the period named.

MARINE TONNAGE, FOREIGN AND DOMESTIC.

The total foreign tonnage for 1880 is set down at 15,239,534; of which Great Britain leads with 7,948,320; Germany with 1,089,740 and Norway and Sweden with 1,235,000. New York has 50 per cent of the entire tonnage, Boston and Philadelphia about equally divided, following with about 10 per cent each. The total tonnage of the merchant marine of the United States for the same year was 4,068,035, of which 2,856,476 is steam and 1,211,559 sail; the foreign trade absorbs 1,314,402; the coast trade 2,738,686; whale fisheries 38,408; cod fisheries 77,539. In the same year the total tonnage built was 167,409,900, a falling off of over 25 per cent from the previous year, a decline of about the same ratio against '78 and of more than 125 per cent from the year '74.

AREAS OF THE PRINCIPAL STATES &c., POPULATION.

In acreage Texas leads with 175,587,840; California with 100,992,640; Nevada with 71,739,600; Colorado 66,880,000; while Pennsylvania comes in for 29,440,000; and New York with 30,080,000; and little Delaware with 1,356,800. In population New York leads with 5,083,810; Pennsylvania follows with 4,282,786; Ohio 3,198,288; Illinois 3,078,769; Missouri 2,168,804; down to Delaware 146,654; and Wyoming Territory 20,788; and Alaska 40,441. The total number of acres of the public domain disposed of for the year is 9,194,376.84.

POSTOFFICES AND POST ROUTES.

The total number of postoffices is 42,989; extent of the post routes 343,888; revenue to the department \$33,315,479; expenditures \$36,542,804; salaries to postmasters \$7,718,784; transportation of the mail \$22,255,984.

POPULATION.

The total population of the United States in 1800 was 5,308,483 against 50,152,866 in 1880. The increase has been as follows: 1810, 7,239,881; 1820, 9,643,825; 1830, 12,866,020; 1840, 17,069,453; 1850, 23,191,876; 1860, 31,443,321; 1870, 38,558,371.

SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES.

The school population of the States and Territories (1879) is about 15,000,000; number enrolled scholars, 9,422,686; number of scholars in daily attendance, 5,280,050; number of teachers, 272,685; number of male teachers, 105,828; number of female teachers, 142,501; public-school income about \$83,704,638; expenditure, about \$78,19,028; permanent school fund, \$110,264,434; average daily attendance 5,281,050.

The number of colleges 364; number of instructors 735; number of students, 28,456, in preparatory department. Number of instructors collegiate department, 3,506; students, 31,616; income from pro-

ductive funds, \$2,684,077; receipts for 1879, \$1,929,060; volumes in college libraries, 2,301,991; value of grounds and buildings, \$37,209,354.

RELIGIOUS SEATS OF LEARNING.

Total number of theological seminaries 131; of professors, 615; students, 4,734. Of these the Baptists lead with 18 seminaries and 858 students; the Roman Catholics comes next with 17 seminaries, 129 professors and 946 students; then comes the Presbyterians, the figures being 15, 73, 617; Methodists Episcopal, 13, 57, 471; Protestant Episcopal, 15, 63, 272; Lutheran, 14, 45, 401; Congregational, 10, 64, 364.
