Strawberry shortcake now being in order, we print the following recipt for the benefit of our lady readers. It makes a very nice addition to the tea table, or can be used as a dessert. Take one quart of sifted flour, stir very thoroughly into it half a teaspoonful of soda; one teaspoonful of cream of tartar must be well mixed into it, a tablespoonful of butter, one teaspoonful of salt, about a coffee Range, a foot turning lathe, and a foot jig N. P. Hicks. cup full of water. It is best mixed with a knife, cutting it through and through, and if ossible do not put your hands into it except in rolling it out. The mass should be as moist as you con well manage. Roll it smoothly out, making two round cakes of about half an inch in thickness. Bake in a quick oven.
