The following act of the Legislature, which is now a law, is important to both school directors and teachers:

SECTION 1. That from and after the passage of this act, it shall be the duty of the school directors of the several school districts of this Commonwealth, and they are hereby required to allow the school teachers employed in the said school districts, who are actually engaged in teaching school therein, the time and wages whilst attending and participating in the exercises of the annual county insti-tutes for the improvement of teachers.

SEC. 2. That at the close of the annual sessions of the said institutes, it shall be the sessions of the said institutes, it shall be the duty of the several county, city and borough superintendents to make a report to each Board of School Directors in their respective jurisdictions, setting forth the number of days that each teacher shall have attended and participated in the exercises of the said annual Teachers' Institute which said annual Teachers' Instit annual Teachers' Institute, which said report shall be the basis for allowing the teachers their time and wages; provided that the provisions of this act shall not extend to the First School District of Pennsylvania, nor to the counties wherein special laws regulating or relating to county institutes are in force.
