JARED HEARL Esq. of Standing Stone, has shown us a summons issued by the late Judge GEORGE SCOTT, while acting as Justice of the Peace in Wysox township Luzerne county, in September 1811, a year before Bradford County was organized. The form of the blank is about the same as the one used now, is printed on very inferior paper, but looks as clean and neat after seventy years as it did when first issued. The writ was served by WM. DININGER, constable, and the return is made in a clear, legible hand. Mr. DININGER is well remembered by the older people of Towanda, as the school teacher of half a century and more ago. He was an educated German, very near-sighted and exceedingly passionate. Many amusing anecdotes are still related of him by his former pupils.

One of the counsel in the matter of the Fortune Bay award says that he has received ten per cent of the entire award.

The amount of five per cent coupons received at the Treasury in Washington for continuance now aggregates \$82,000,000.

There are now twenty-five tons of silver bullion in the Philadelphia mint. The gold and silver on hand is valued at \$31,000,000.

Prof. Klein, of Hartford, Ky, claims that he discovered the comet now attracting attention last September. He says that it is the comet of 1783.

It is understood that the new Minister to Peru will be instructed to do what he can to rehabilitate the government of Peru, without the direct interference of this country to accomplish it.
