### The News Condensed.

Lafayette College has conferred the degree of LL. D., on Dr. Henry Darling of Hamilton College, N. Y.

A London dispatch announces that at the Henly Regatta, on the Thames, yesterday, the Cornell crew were beaten, coming in a poor third.

The American Protestant Association of the United States is in session in Wilmington, Del., with sixty delegates, representing most of the States. Samuel Leggett of Philadelphia, is elected Grand Master.

The steamer Vandalia, from Hamburg for New York, was spoken on Sunday, in latitude 28 north and longitude 15 west, with her shaft broken. Steamers have been sent to her assistance from London. The Vandalia carries one thousand passengers.

The Investigating Committee appointed by Bishop Potter, has decided that there are no grounds for arraigning Rev. Cowley, of Shepherd's Fold notoriety, before an Ecclesiastical Tribunal. Cowley thus remains a clergyman of the Episcopal church in good standing.

Judge Bockes confirmed the report of the referee in the suit to foreclose the mortgage on the Adrioudack railroad, the amount due being \$9,736,000. The sale will take place at Saratoga on September 15th. Included with the road is 700,000 acres in three thousand parcels, in the counties of Hamilton, Warren, Essex, Franklin, St. Lawrence, Herkimer and Saratoga.
