### The News Condensed.

The profits of Sing Sing prison for June were \$4,000.

The Yale—Harvard boat race yesterday was won by the Yale crew by two lengths.

The public debt was decreased \$12,323,159 53, last month. The reduction for the year is \$101,578,483 36.

The receipts of the New York post office for the fiscal year were \$3,782,000 and the expenses \$850,000.

The Yorktown Centennial Commission has accepted a model for the proposed monument. It will cost \$100,000.

Fourteen hundred and eighty-six new postoffices have been added the past year to the number already existing.

Platt has peremptorily withdrawn from the Senatorial contest and it is quite probable that Cornell will be chosen his successor.

The *Tribune* does not believe the story connecting Senator Platt with a disgraceful scandal at Albany, and to its everlasting credit refuses to print it.

The United States Treasurer yesterday mailed 54,000 checks, representing \$5,400,000, in payment of the interest on the registered four per cents of 1907; also, 1,500 checks representing \$2,000,000 in payment of the semi-annual interest on the Pacific Railway currency six es.
