The Real Number of Comets.

The real number of comets which have visited these parts of space must be very much larger, probably amounting to not less than 3,000, since it would appear from the experience of the past century that only one in every five becomes sufficiently conspicuous to the naked eye to attract general attention. A considerable number of comets have doubtless appeared in past times in the southern heavens only, so as to be invisable in Europe and allowing for this, we shall probably be within reasonable limits when we assume that upwards of 4000 have approached the sun within the orbit of Mars since the commencement of the Christian era.

The tail is often of great length; that of 1858 called Donati's comet, being 50,000,000 miles in length, while that of the comet of 1843, one of the most brilliant ever known was quite three times as long.


