We find the following obituary notice of a former resident of this county, in the last Blossburg Register. Mrs. J. P. VANFLEET, of this place is a daughter of the deceased, and there are many others in Bradford who will be pained by the announcement:

David Ingham, the subject of this brief memoir, was born in Huddersfield, York-shire, England, January 4, 1800, and died at the residence of his son, A. M. Ingham, in Blossburg, June 21, 1881.

Mr. Ingham came to America when 25 years of age; he remained in New York two years and then came to Menroeton, Bradford county, commencing a woolen factory, and prosecuted that line of business about 20 years, after which he purchased a farm in LeRoy, continuing his agricultural pursuits 25 years.

The wife of his youth, the companion of his early toil, died about 31 years ago, leaving him with the double responsibility of a family of children. Mr. Ingham was a pioneer indeed, a man of great endurance and earnest toil. He was a kind and indulgent parent, a neighbor greatly beloved and a good citizen. The writer of this brief sketch had the great pleasure of his society during the last days of his eventful life. Asking him how he felt about the future, he replied, "It is all well; I am just waiting to put off this tabernacle." One of the last intelligible words the writer heard him articulate was "Salvation! Salvation? Salvation!" His expiring moments were the most beautiful illustration and exemplification of the last hours of a believer, we have witnessed in a long time.

"So, fades a summer cloud away,
So, fades the gale, when storms are o'er
So, sweetly shuts the eye of day,
So, dies a wave along the shore;
A holy quiet reigns around,
A peace which life nor death destroys,
And nought disturbs the peace profound
Which his unfettered soul enjoys.

According to his wish, long ago expressed, his mortal remains were borne by the loving hands of his kind children to the East Canton cemetery to rest by the side of the mother of his children, until the brightness and beauty of the first resurrection shall penetrate the darkness of the grave, and the voice of the Son of God shall be heard all over the universe, saying: "Arise ye dead, come ye blessed of my Father, sit down with me on my throne."

WHEREAS, In the dispensation of God's providence, our much esteemed brother Frank Bunyan has been removed from among us, and that while our charter is still draped in the emblem of mourning, we are admonished that in the midst of life we are in death. Therefore,

Resolved, That in the death of Brother Bunyan, the grange has lost a faithful member; the wife and family a kind and affectionate husband and father, the parents a devoted son; the brothers and sisters a devoted brother; and the neighbors a kind and obliging neighbor.

Resolved, That while we submit to the will of our Heavenly Father, we will cherish the memory of our departed brother, and sympathize with all who like ourselves feel the loss of him, with the consolation that our loss is his eternal gain.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to our county papers, requesting them to publish the same; also to the *Farmer's Friend*, and that a copy be presented to the family; also entered upon the minutes, and that our charter be draped in mourning for 90 days.
