The President Still improving.

The following official bulletins announcing the condition of the President were posted yesterday:

OFFICIAL BULLETINS.

8:15 A. M.

The condition of the President continues favorable. He is more comfortable than on any previous morning. Pulse 96, temperature 99-7, respiration 23. The wound is beginning to discharge healthy pus.

1 P. M.

The condition of the President continues quite as favorable as this morning. Pulse 100, temperature 100-8, respiration 23. Unless some unfavorable change should occur no further bulletin will be issued until 8:30 P. M.

8 P. M.

The President's condition continues favorable. He passed a very comfortable afternoon, and has taken more nutriment than on previous days. Pulse, 108; temperature, 101.3; respiration, 24. If the conditions continue favorable, there will be no further bulletin till to-morrow morning.

The News Condensed.

The anti-Conkling republicans of the New York legislature held a caucus last evening and nominated Warren Miller and E. G. Lapham for sehators. The stalwarts will not support them.

The South is apparently more solicitous for the recovery of the President than other portions of the country. The Governor of Kentucky has issued a proclamation making the 14th of July a day of public fasting and prayer for the recovery of the President.

There is a marked improvement in the condition of the streets of New York since June 16th. Four hundred and twenty-eight miles of street have been cleaned and 37,000 loads of ashes and 27,000 loads of street dirt have been removed.

It is said on good authority that a proclamation convening Congress for a special session was prepared Thursday, or before, and signed by the President, to be issued in the event of his illness taking an unfavorable or necessarily fatal turn. The object of this action is to provide against any possible contingency. The session would be called and elect a President of the Senate pro tem, and a Speaker of the House, and no miscellaneous business would likely be considered.
