OFFICIAL BULLETINS.

8 A. M.

The President passed the most comfortable night of any since receiving the wound, sleeping tranquilly and with few breaks. The general progress of his symptoms continue favorable. Pulse 106, temperature 100, respiration 23.

7 P. M.

The President's symptoms continue to make favorable progress. Pulse 108, temperature 101-9, respiration 24. No further bulletins will be issued until to-morrow morning.

The News Condensed.

Congressman Hendrick B. Wright, of Wilkesbarre, Pa., is dangerously ill.

Rev. J. B. Kerfoot, bishop of the Pittsburgh Episcopal Church diocese, died yesterday.

Prof. C. V. Riley has been appointed Entomologist of the Department of Agriculture.

Walker Blaine has entered upon his duties as Third Assistant Secretary of State.

The excess of assessments on the capital and deposits of banks in May, amounted to \$41,000 more than those of last year.

Governor Hoyt has been requested to address the Governors of the States and Territories on the subject of issuing a concurrent thanksgiving proclamation over the recovery of the President.

Lightning struck the British bark *Beatrice* at Philadelphia on Friday, and her cargo of oil exploded. A sailor was blown into the water and drowned, and the captain and six others were injured. The vessel was burned.

Before sailing for home Sir Edward Thornton was presented with an address of respect and affection by British residents of New York. Minister Thornton has for the thirteen years past held the position that he now vacates, and in that time has won many warm friends, who are loth to have him make his home elsewhere.
